REFLECTING ON THE ORIGINS OF OUR COMMUNITIES

There is often the perception that all Hispanics share one identity, when in reality Hispanic cultures are not monolithic. We describe our identity in many ways that reflect the diverse origins of our community, our immigrant experience, and geography.

Along with differences in our identity, we also share differences in our language. Spanish is regionally influenced, much like American English vs. British English. Mexican Spanish is different from Chilean Spanish, which is different from Spanish spoken in Spain. The music, the food, the people--we are lively and dynamic people with a strong sense of family and unity.

Although some of us have been here prior to the formation of the United States as we know it today, for many, our ancestors, grandparents, and parents immigrated to the U.S. for a better life. It is for them and past generations that we honor their contribution to this country's history, culture, and its achievements.

FACTS

- National Hispanic Heritage Month is celebrated from September 15 to October 15 celebrating the histories, cultures, and contributions of American citizens whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean and Central & South America
- Enacted into law on August 17, 1988, by Ronald Reagan,
 Hispanic Heritage Month was officially created after George
 H.W. Bush proposed extending the original Hispanic Heritage
 Week under Lyndon B. Johnson.
- September 15 is significant because it is the anniversary of independence for these Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua – Mexico and Chile celebrate on the 16th and 18th respectively.


- 4. While Hispanic refers to a person who is from, or a descendant of someone who is from, any Spanish-speaking country, Latino refers to a person who is from, or a descendant of someone who is from, a country in Latin America.
- 5. Along with integrating the several independence days, NHHM coincides with Columbus Day or Día de la Raza (celebrated on Monday Oct 11, 2021) celebrating the diversity of cultures that resulted from the fateful Spanish encounter with the New World; traditionally, this is also celebrated by Italian-American immigrants, as well, and in recent years been celebrated as Indigenous People's Day in much of North America.
- 6. The Law Library of Congress has compiled guides to commemorative observations, including a comprehensive inventory of the Public Laws, Presidential Proclamations and congressional resolutions related to National Hispanic Heritage Month
- 7. The Latino Heritage Internship Program (LHIP) is a partnership with the National Park Service and Environment for the Americas that offers internship opportunities for mainly young Latino Americans in a variety of career fields: https://latinoheritageintern.com/
- 8. According to the U.S. Census Bureau 2020, the percentage of Hispanic or Latino population across the United States is 18.7% with New Mexico having the highest proportion at 47.7% and California with the highest number of residents at just over 15.5 million.
- 9. According to the U.S Bureau of Labor Statistics, Hispanic or Latinos hover at just about 2/3 participation rate in the civilian labor force out of the noninstitutionalized civilian population— 65.7% percent to be exact as of July 2021.
- 10. There has been a 23.0% increase in the Latin American population in the United States since the 2010 Census.
