Roosevelt Scott, Jr. is the owner of Triple Threat Solutions. He started his personal protection journey in the U.S. Marine Corps as a Weapons and Tactics instructor. In the Marines, Roosevelt was a team leader of a Special Response Team. Roosevelt trained with the L.A.P.D. SWAT, British Special Air Service, FBI'S Hostage Rescue Team, and numerous other teams around the world.



Government Affairs Updates

Fed-OSHA extends its National Emphasis Program on COVID-19

- “Uncertainty in the rulemaking process” is causing delays
- The COVID-19 health-care rule is an “immediate focus” of agency

Fed-OSHA will soon announce an extension of the agency’s National Emphasis Program for Covid-19, while continuing to work on permanent standards for both its pandemic-related and general infectious disease regulations. Fed-OSHA also announced it will then focus on a permanent infectious disease standard once the agency establishes its COVID-19 rule. This infectious disease standard would concentrate on the health-care industry, but the scope may widen to include other “high-risk” industries.

Cal-OSHA’s Covid-19 ETS is alive and revised

Revised Emergency Temporary Standards (ETS) are Effective May 6, 2022. Defining and re-defining what constitutes multiple COVID-19 infections and what constitutes a COVID-19 “outbreak” is evolving. The [website](#) provides the best information.

Government Affairs Updates

Fed-OSHA begins rulemaking process to revise standards for occupational exposure to lead

Fed-OSHA asks the public to comment on the following areas of the lead standards:

- Blood lead level triggers for medical removal protection
- Medical surveillance provisions, including triggers and frequency of blood lead monitoring
- Permissible exposure limit (PEL)
- Ancillary provisions for personal protective equipment, housekeeping, hygiene and training

Occupational Lead Poisoning Prevention Fee

The California Department of Tax and Fee Administration, in cooperation with the California Department of Public Health (CDPH), have developed an [Occupational Lead Poisoning Prevention Fee](#). Who pays the fee? An employer in an industry category that has been identified by the CDPH as having a potential for occupational lead poisoning. Why? To prevent occupational lead poisoning. The “fee” was established by SB 240 and added [California Health and Safety Code Section 105185](#).

- 1) OSRM B63 Introduction to NFPA 70E – July 16 & 23

Instruction covers the basics of electrical safety, including associated hazards, the hierarchy of control and its application in controlling electrical hazards. Advanced instruction on arc flash and arc blast protection will also be covered.
